Subject: Invitation to attend the *University Faculty Forum on Connection with*

Students: Some Best Practices in Teaching and Learning at Cornell

Wednesday, March 15, 2000, 4:30-6:00 p.m. Call Alumni Auditorium, Kennedy Hall

One of the fundamental tenets of Cornell's graduate research degree programs is that our students learn best through a close and sustained association with their faculty mentors. In fact, we track residency credits to assure that the opportunity for this close encounter of the best kind can occur.

Our undergraduates are not provided this level and extent of access to the faculty. In fact, most faculty contact with undergraduates occurs in larger, formal courses that inherently provide much less 'face time' and individual mentoring. Yet, our undergraduates consistently report in course evaluations and other formal surveys a strong desire for more individual attention. They want us to be interested in them and for us to be able to write meaningful letters of recommendation.

If you wish that you could do a better job of connecting with your students – despite the heavy demands on your time to fulfill your many other university obligations – come hear four of our faculty who are the most recent recipients of the Weiss Presidential Fellows Award (our only university-wide faculty recognition for outstanding teaching), share their enthusiasm and their insights about connecting with students. We've also invited two articulate students (the President of the Student Assembly and a current student-elected Trustee of Cornell University) to help us identify teaching and learning practices that students appreciate.

We'll not limit our attention to teaching and learning in the classroom. As faculty, what are our responsibilities for nurturing learning outside the classroom? How might we improve the intellectual experience for Cornell students – inside and outside the classroom?

As an extension of this Forum, we will solicit contributions of best practices from faculty and Emeritus across the University and create a publication of 'Best Practices in Teaching and Learning at Cornell'.

Spend 90 minutes on March 15th learning about approaches your colleagues have found to be especially effective in connecting with students.
