The most important point to make is that in the United States, publishers control the textbook landscape and are driven by profits. This means that they control the opt-out/opt-in landscape, they control which books the library can purchase and make available to students (both print and ebook), and they control not only the textbook content but in many cases, the entire course if faculty choose to utilize courseware for assignments and tests. Fundamentally, the library and bookstore are at the mercy of publishers when providing access to required textbooks. This flat-fee program isn't perfect but it is a significant step toward supporting our students. Should we move toward OER? YES! Should we push for more support for the development of OER materials by Cornell Faculty? YES! But these steps take time.
